What are attention and listening difficulties?

Children with these difficulties may show some of the following characteristics:

- Appears to ignore you
- Struggles to sit still
- Talks when they should be listening
- Often unable to tell you what you have been talking about
- Do not appear to know what to do when given instructions
- Can only concentrate on one thing at a time
- Easily distracted
- Do not settle with one toy but flits from activity to activity

How do these problems affect a child in school?

- Unable to sit still and pay attention in whole class group activities
- Unable to listen effectively in the whole class group at carpet time
- Unable to follow more than one instruction at a time in class
- Child may be easily distracted by classroom noise, affecting ability to work independently
- Unable to maintain attention to a task, or switch attention between activities
- Difficulty learning and remembering new information

What can you do to help?

- Get down to the child's level
- Call their name first—and make sure they are looking at you
- Go to a quieter room or try switching the TV off
- Only introduce one activity at a time
- Use gestures and objects as clues to gain attention and help your child understand
- Use pictures to help them remember sequences of routines or what you want them to do next. We have some printable ones available for you for free.
- Talk about what your child is doing, using short, simple sentences
- Break down instructions into smaller parts
- Repeat instructions if not understood first time and support with images if necessary.
